### **Enduring Understandings**

#### **Areas of Focus**

- Learning to read and write written language:
  - Creation of new words through rhyming and adding or substituting sounds in simple one-syllable words
  - Associate letter sounds of consonants with spelling of words
  - Recognize and write high frequency words such as do, does, is, are, he, she, me, my, to, of, you
  - Associate the long and short sounds with common spellings of the five major vowels
  - Distinguish between similarly spelled words by identifying the sounds of the letters that differ

- Telling and retelling stories and answering and asking questions about stories
- Telling and retelling main ideas from informational text and identifying supporting details
